Podcasts

Sign Up to the Future Farm Resilience Fund (FFRF)

The Future Farm Resilience Fund (FFRF) is a FREE service available to farmers and landowners in England. It provides business, environmental, and technical support and is fully funded by Defra. SRUC is one of those providing this support in conjunction with ADAS.

What help is available for farmers?

Farmers and landowners can access a variety of services through SRUC funded through the FFRF.

- · Carbon Audits and understanding results.
- Business reviews, business plan implementation, environmental credentials, building support.
- Technical support including animal welfare, soil health etc.

What does this help look like on farm?

In the previous round of the FFRF, SRUC clients benefited from detailed Carbon Management Plans. For example, Will Case's suckler herd in Cumbria looked at the use of manure and impact on productivity and carbon emissions. They are now ready to exploit the up-and-coming Slurry Investment Schemes along with other grants.



Membership Update

The membership of PSGHS continues to grow, an update on membership figures can be seen below (correct as of the start of March 2023).

Members may have more than one flock or herd. These are counted separately if they are in more than one scheme (i.e. the same sheep flock is in both the MV and Scrapie schemes), or some members may have a commercial and pedigree flock/herd that they run separately, or separate flocks of different breeds.

The total membership of each scheme is greater than the number that are fully accredited due to a number of flocks that are either still in the process of gaining accreditation (for example doing qualifying tests) or have lost their accredited status and are trying to regain it.

The top ten most popular breeds in PSGHS are listed below, ranked by the number of flocks keeping that breed.








Rob Beaumont Andersey Farm, Wantage, Oxfordshire

Rob Beaumont first purchased Andersey Farm in 1989, with poultry units being the sole livestock focus on the 60 acre holding. Bringing the poultry enterprise to a close in 2004, Rob decided to invest in a flock of Southdown sheep, needing livestock to keep his interest in the farm. The Beaumonts were initially drawn to the breed due to Rob's wife, Jan, liking their appearance, but having researched their history Rob became fascinated by the fact that they had declined in popularity in commercial



flocks. "They seemed to have fallen from grace, which is why I chose to join the Signet recording scheme, to prove they were still a viable terminal sire," comments Rob.

Currently running around 80 ewes, Rob has kept the flock closed since becoming MV accredited in 2015. To avoid in-breeding the flock is split into seven ewe families and seven ram lines, with Rob also using the Shearwell Flock recorder and software, as well as the Signet EBV data, to make breeding decisions. Lambing currently begins in the middle of March, with the aim of moving this into April in the future, with all lambs born inside to help ensure they are assigned the correct ewes.



With all sales being done privately off the farm, the main motivation for joining the Premium Sheep & Goat Health Schemes for MV accreditation was to show the health status to prospective buyers, with Rob adding that *"it's also peace of mind that at least one disease is not going to be an issue."* Keeping the flock closed and deciding not to take the sheep to shows and sales are all decisions made to protect their health status. Rob notes that disease has been an issue over the years but with the input of their local vet practice, Larkmead Vets, they have finally got most health issues under control. *"Without vet support the sheep would have left the farm. We use more vaccines than previously, and they work. There was a background problem with abortion which caused me a lot of concern, but we have solved that issue over the last two or three years."*

Having been runner up on a number of occasions, the Andersey flock's 2022 lamb crop won the Cresswell Crook, awarded to the most improved flock of Southdowns. The win represents years of hard work, with Rob breeding his own high-performance rams and culling low index ewes and rams quite ruthlessly. Rob also attributes his success to his commitment to using EID in recording birth details, weights and scanning results, which has been worth the investment.

On the progress made with the breed Rob comments, "if you look at the Signet Recording website, you will see that the Southdown ram is now able to meet the demands of the modern sheep breeder looking for a terminal sire. One of the traits of Southdown rams is they work exceptionally well on ewe lambs." Moving forward, Rob aims to continue to improve the rams as terminal sires and regain their popularity with commercial flock masters, as well as improving the ewes on the maternal side.

EuroSheep – a network for interactive and innovative knowledge exchange on sheep health and nutrition across Europe



SRUC and SAC colleagues are part of the EU-funded EuroSheep project which aimed at creating a network of researchers, advisors, farmers and other industry actors interested in sheep health and nutrition. The project started in January 2020 and involves partners from France, Ireland, Hungary, Greece, Italy, Spain, Turkey and the UK.

The project relies on efficient regular discussion and knowledge exchanges between the different levels of the network, within and between each country involved. Regular



Map of the EuroSheep countries


workshops are organised, nationally first to gather knowledge or feedback from each participating country, followed by transnational workshops where farmers, advisors and researchers all meet and share information from their own countries.

The project is focused on farmers' needs and challenges regarding sheep health and nutrition. After an online survey, where more than 1300 people responded, more than 90 technical and/or practical solutions have been proposed by

the project countries, with 49 on health. Additionally, a series of 26 factsheets, with 8 of them particularly centred on health issues, have been produced by the consortium. Finally, a collection of 52 "tips and tricks" proposed by farmers from the participating countries has been compiled.

The project is reaching an end, but all solutions, tips and tricks and factsheets are available on the EuroSheep website (<u>www.eurosheep.network</u>), which has been setup in 7 languages. The project is also supported by social media, e.g. Twitter (@EuroSheepEU), Facebook

(https://www.facebook.com/EuroSheep/) and a dedicated YouTube channel (EuroSheep EU), where videos of the best practices and solutions from the partner countries have been uploaded.
